

Many look to the American Robin as a clear indication that spring has arrived. But what about that Robin you saw in January?

Where Robins winter is more dependent on food availability than temperature.

Some flocks will fly north during the winter and then back south depending on where food is available, so it's possible you could see them during any part of the winter.





Want a few more clues that spring is on the way?







Look and listen for Redwing Blackbirds- most, if not all, migrate out of our area in the winter and return when spring is around the corner.



Finally, keep a nose out for the smell of skunk- they are one of the first mammals to emerge from winter "hibernation" (technically winter lethargy).
